AGree has also commissioned research and papers to enhance understanding and promote dialogue.

Based on this extensive dialogue and targeted research, AGree's Advisory Committee and Co-Chairs have issued consensus recommendations to tackle critical challenges facing the food and agriculture system.

AGree's Platform for Change

AGree is collaborating with diverse partners to advance recommendations that target policymakers, the private sector, and civil society across eight Initiatives. They are:

- 1. Working Landscapes: Achieving Productivity, Profitability, and Environmental Outcomes;
- 2. Food & Nutrition: Cultivating Community Health;
- 3. <u>International Development: Promoting Development through Food and Agriculture;</u>
- 4. Immigration Reform: Achieving a Stable, Legal Workforce;
- 5. Research & Innovation: Strengthening Agricultural Research, Education, and Extension;
- 6. Next Generation: Attracting Young People to Food and Agriculture;
- 7. Local Food: Revitalizing Community-based Food Systems; and
- 8. Risk Management: Protecting Farmers, Conserving Resources.

<u>AGree has released consensus recommendations on six of these Initiatives</u>. Working with industry, producers, civil society, and government partners, AGree provides a trusted platform for dialogue on contentious and emerging issues facing food and agriculture while focusing on implementation and advocacy.
